




Types of Incidents and Violations





FKNMS Joint Enforcement Agreement

Since 2000, FKNMS has provided almost \$15 million to FWC for funding of officers and equipment and continues to provide \$1.5 million per year in resources to FWC to enforce FKNMS regulations. These funds are in addition to the \$1.1 million per year NOAA provides to FWC for enforcement of federal regulations throughout the State of Florida. More than 30% of the FKNMS budget goes towards the direct support of enforcement.

Peter Gladding: \$1.9 million dollars

\$150,000-\$200,000 per year to operation and maintenance of vehicles and vessels.

FKNMS also provides mechanics to maintain enforcement vessels, a team to maintain buoys that mark zone boundaries, a team to conduct assessments of injuries to sanctuary resources, and a team to provide programs educating the public on FKNMS regulations and the significance of sanctuary resources.





- A marine life wholesale dealer out of Grassy Key was charged with a violation of the Lacey Act for smuggling and selling corals nationally and internationally.
- An employee of the Idaho Aquarium was found guilty of obstruction of justice (federal court) and faces up to 5 years in prison and a fine up to \$250,000.
- Two Pompano Beach men were charged with exporting mislabeled sharks that were caught in the Keys. They were fined and surrendered their business licenses.
- A California based dealer obtained nurse sharks from the Keys that were obtained illegally from a local trap fisherman. The trap fisherman has since died but the dealer is facing violations of Lacey act and could be fined and incarcerated.


2012 FKNMS JEA (July 1, 2012-June 30, 2013)

- 5,428 at sea personnel hours, 4,497 vessel hours, and 6,479 land based personnel hours
- Responded to 243 vessel groundings
- Issued 80 warnings and 85 citations for violations of FKNMS regulations

USCG District 7 Sectors Miami and Key West







USCG and USCG Auxiliary Missions Fiscal Year 2013

- USCG Sector Key West small boat station units conducted 1,128 Living Marine Resource boardings and 812 boating safety boardings.
- USCG Auxiliary Aircraft conducted nearly 50 flights totaling over 150 hours documenting 1,684 vessels using Sanctuary Preservation and Research Only Areas
- USCG Auxiliary Flotillas began weekly patrols of Sanctuary Preservation and Research Only Areas to educate boaters, protect FKNMS resources, and promote boating safety
